



Different immigration waves (1875 – 2013):




Foreign population percentage 47.1% (Statec, 2022)

- Divergent development:
- People who identify with traditional religious beliefs and practices, particularly Catholicism, have fallen sharply from 75% to 48% between 2008 and 2021.
- The importance of religion has also fallen over the same period from 42% to 24%.
- For younger generations without a Christian background, their religious and cultural identities are closely intertwined. Compared to Christian cultures, Muslim or Hindu communities are quicker to identify themselves as religious.

- 73.24% of participants believe that individuals of Muslim faith are socially well integrated in the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg,
- 77.92% feel they are safe in the Grand Duchy and
- 64.54% think they are less discriminated against here than in neighbouring countries (France, Belgium, Germany, Netherlands).

BUT

The OIL report also notes:

During the year 2023, 22% (21% in 2022) of respondents reported being victims of Islamophobic acts and 29% (34% in 2022) of them witnessed such acts without being directly affected.

These inicidents are often underreported – incidents may be higher.

 - InterFaith opened up to representatives of different world views and schools of thought and has thus developed more into an intercultural project.

Challenges

Resources – limited

- Reliance on a small team to make it happen (all volunteers)
- Difficulty in recruiting younger members (lack of media competence)
- Difficulty in finding sponsors
- Only 1 main event how to stay in contact in between?

SIZE

- Small manageable personal contacts but impact?
- Scaling up??? Multiplier events? Different schools of thought among Team
- Preaching to the converted?

• Inter-religious or intercultural?

- Some refugee groups reluctant to join interreligious event
- Ethics Foundation religious education important during conflict ridden times.
